Dramatic Litany of Remembrance and Celebration

(For 4 Voices + Visual Projection)

Voice 1 (Narrator):

Today we pause to remember — To honour the dream that took root in 1925. Three great streams of faith flowed together: Methodist, Presbyterian, and Congregationalist — And along with them, many local union churches, Already living into a shared future.

[Visual: Logos or photos of early Methodist, Presbyterian, Congregationalist, and Local Union churches — especially those local to your community.]

Voice 2 (Methodist):

We remember the Methodist Church, alive with song, revival, and a deep concern for the poor. Our faith was born on horseback, carried across the prairies and coastlines by circuit riders who believed in grace, discipline, and social holiness.

All: We give thanks for their passion and their courage.

[Visual: Photo of local or regional Methodist church, or early circuit rider imagery.]

Voice 3 (Presbyterian):

We remember the Presbyterian Church, built on strong roots of study, prayer, and mission. In schools and pulpits, in justice halls and overseas work, they held firm to the Gospel, believing the mind and the heart belonged together in faith.

We give thanks for their wisdom and conviction.

[Visual: Photo of your local Presbyterian church or an image of early Canadian Presbyterian gatherings.]

Voice 4 (Congregationalist):

We remember the Congregational Church, small but mighty shaped by a deep belief in the gathered community, and in each person's freedom to follow Christ faithfully. They gave space for the Spirit to move among equals.

We give thanks for their commitment to community and conscience.

[Visual: Old image of local Congregationalist churches or their creeds/meeting houses.]

Voice 1 (Narrator):

And we remember the Local Union Churches,

often rural or remote places where practical ecumenism had already begun. These churches didn't wait for legislation they chose unity because it just made sense, and because Christ's body was always bigger than boundaries.

We give thanks for their witness to cooperation and shared faith.

Voice 2:

In 1925, they stood together. Some with certainty, others with hesitation but all with hope.

Voice 3:

Hope that together, they could serve better. Hope that the gospel would shine more brightly through united witness.

Voice 4:

Hope that Christ would still be found in rural sanctuaries, in downtown missions, in Sunday School basements and communion tables shared.

All Voices:

For the dream they dared to dream, For the church they chose to become, For the legacy they left to us— We give thanks. We remember. We carry it forward. (candle is lit or bell is rung)
